
Pigeons: Flying Rats or Thoroughbreds of the Sky? Find out at MPL's Family Activity Night on July 8!

The homing pigeon, also known as the rock dove, has long been both reviled and revered. Often dismissed as "vermin with wings," these birds are commonly seen as pests competing for scraps in public spaces. What many people don't realize, however, is the historically vital role pigeons have played throughout human history.

Ancient civilizations such as the Egyptians, Greeks, and Romans used homing pigeons to carry messages. Even Reuters News relied on them in the early 1900s. During both World War I and World War II, homing pigeons were crucial to military communications. Two of the most famous birds—Cher Ami and G.I. Joe—are credited with saving hundreds of lives.

So, when I mention in conversation that I've spent the past 25 years raising and racing homing pigeons—birds that have flown 100, 200, even 500 plus miles in a single day, often averaging 40–45 MPH and sometimes exceeding 60 MPH with favorable winds—people take notice. And they're intrigued.

I'm always happy to share my perspective on this remarkable one-pound bird, equipped with a compass-map navigation system that scientists still don't fully understand. They are not "nuisances"—they're elite athletes of the sky with a legacy that deserves far more respect.

The conversation usually begins with me sharing how I grew up in Sheboygan Falls and became fascinated with pigeons around the age of ten. My neighborhood friends and I would catch wild young pigeons and raise them in a makeshift coop. Eventually, after some persistent pleading, my parents agreed to a more permanent setup—and my grandfather built a small coop attached to our garage. At ten years old, I was unofficially a "pigeon fancier."

Over the next few years, I kept about a dozen pigeons. Some were given to me young enough to be "settled" or "re-homed" in my loft, while others were the offspring of my own birds. I never raced them or joined a pigeon club, but caring for them and taking them on short training flights with my dad brought me a lot of joy. It also gave my friends—whose parents weren't quite as indulgent—a chance to share in the fun.

Eventually, teenage life took over. My time shifted to sports, school, and girls. But, as I would later learn, once you catch the pigeon bug, it never really leaves you.

For the past 25+ years, I've been breeding, raising, and racing homing pigeons. And in all that time, I've never stopped learning—or marveling—at them. Watching a tightly formed flock soar around the neighborhood on a windy day, banking against the gusts and whooshing over rooftops at what must be close to 70 MPH, is a spectacle. I still chuckle at the strutting cocks trying to impress the hens—like boys at a high school dance. And I still get a rush on race day, especially when one of my birds returns from Luverne, MN (428 miles) with a time that beats out 100 other birds from 15 lofts—earning just enough to buy a 40-pound bag of pigeon feed.

So—Flying Rats or Thoroughbreds of the Sky?

I hope that you'll be able to join me at for Family Activity Night 6:30 PM on July 8 at Manitowoc Public Library when we explore Wings of Wonder—All About Pigeons with Mark Maurer. We'll gather on the Library Lawn for a conversation about these often-misunderstood flying wonders, complete with a *live bird release* (weather permitting).





Manitowoc Public Library to Offer Walking Tours of Historic Downtown Manitowoc This August

As you drive down 8th Street, you might not be aware of how much history you pass along the way. Downtown Manitowoc has seen significant change over the decades, but landmarks of our city's past remain—if you know where to look!

Manitowoc Public Library is offering an opportunity to learn more about the origins of some of Downtown Manitowoc's most iconic buildings. That said, we hope that you will be able to join us for "ManitoWalk: Historic Downtown Walking Tour."

Manitowoc Public Library is offering two opportunities for you to take a walk with us and learn about some Downtown Manitowoc history:

- Monday August 4 from 10-11:30 AM
- Registration opens Monday July 21 at 9 AM
- Monday August 11 from 5:30-7 PM
- Registration opens Monday July 28 at 9 AM

The tour will cover 10 historic buildings and focus on the stories of those who established those venues. You'll hear about businesses that were once the cornerstones of downtown like *Schuette Brothers Department Store* and *Fehr's Jewelry Store*. Learn how a jailbreak helped lead to the Manitowoc County Court House we know today. The tour concludes at *Kathy's Stage Door Pub*, which is the current occupant of the oldest building on our route (built in 1853!).

It is truly remarkable how much history is contained in just a few blocks!

Registration is required and space is limited. You must be at least 18 years old and be able to withstand walking and standing for over an hour. We will view the historic buildings from the sidewalk only (the tour does not include the interior of the buildings). In the event of inclement weather, the event will be canceled.

Tours start at Manitowoc Public Library outside by the flagpole. Please arrive 10 minutes prior to the start of the walking tour.


This is a wonderful opportunity for both new and lifelong residents of our area to learn a little more about the community that we all call home. Hope to see you there!

Hello. This is Crime Prevention Sgt. Paul Krock from the Manitowoc Police Department and I wanted to share some exciting information with you about our upcoming <u>National Night Out</u> event being held at Manitowoc Public Library on Tuesday, August 5, from 6-7:30 PM.

<u>National Night Out</u> is an annual event that provides a great opportunity to bring police and citizens together under positive circumstances to create stronger ties between law enforcement, neighborhoods, and communities, creating a safer environment for everyone.

This year's <u>National Night Out</u> will offer community members a wide variety of activities, as well as information on keeping children and families safe. One of the many activities that children can participate in during this year's <u>National Night Out</u> is a scavenger hunt. Children who complete the scavenger hunt are eligible to receive school supplies that have been generously donated by Walmart.

The Manitowoc Police Department will also be offering free child identification kits. These child identification kits take only a few minutes to complete and are stored at home by parents or guardians should law enforcement ever need their child's vital information to assist in locating a missing child.

Officers from the Manitowoc Police Department and firefighters from the Manitowoc Fire Department will be available in the Library's Parking Lot during National Night Out to provide children and families with a chance to get up close and explore our emergency vehicles that are used every day to help keep the community safe.

Officer Schleis and the Manitowoc Police Department's newest K9—K9 Rolo—will also demonstrate how K9s can assist police in finding lost citizens, illegal drugs, and apprehending dangerous criminal suspects. Officer Schleis and K9 Rolo's demonstration will showcase a K9s unique role in helping to keep the community safe.

New to this year's event will be a drone demonstration, conducted by Officer Kluenker that will highlight how this technology is used to assist law enforcement in their duties. Also, making their first appearance at National Night Out is Manitowoc County 4-H who will have several animals onsite for children to interact with.



Calling all young explorers! All Aboard for an afternoon of discovery at Shipwreck Detectives, a hands-on maritime archaeology adventure designed especially for families! Join us at Manitowoc Public Library on Wednesday, August 6, at 2 PM in the Balkansky Community Room for an exciting look beneath the waves, presented by Wisconsin Maritime Museum.

Exploring Lake Michigan's Shipwrecks

Lake Michigan is home to hundreds of shipwrecks, each with its own fascinating story. From schooners and steamships to tugboats and barges, these vessels once navigated the Great Lakes, carrying passengers and cargo across the waters. Some met their untimely fate due to treacherous storms, navigational errors, or collisions, leaving behind submerged mysteries waiting to be unraveled.

One recent discovery is the *J.C. Ames*, a 160-foot tugboat scuttled near Manitowoc in 1923. Once among the largest and most powerful tugs on the Great Lakes, it boasted a 670-horsepower engine. Its wreck offers insight into early 20th-century ship retirement practices and the evolving life cycle of working vessels.

Arguably, the most iconic shipwreck in the region is the *Rouse Simmons*, affectionately known as the "Christmas Tree Ship." This three-masted schooner sank in 1912 while transporting a festive cargo of evergreens to Chicago. Now resting off Rawley Point, the wreck endures as a poignant tribute to the area's maritime heritage.

The Science of Underwater Archaeology

Shipwreck exploration goes beyond diving—it is about uncovering history through scientific methods. Maritime archaeologists rely on sonar imaging, underwater photography, and meticulous documentation to investigate wrecks while preserving their delicate structures. The Wisconsin Historical Society's Maritime Preservation Program plays a vital role in safeguarding and interpreting these submerged artifacts for future generations.

Participants in the Shipwreck Detectives program will get an introduction to these techniques, learning how experts analyze artifacts, map wreck sites, and uncover clues about the past. To bring shipwreck exploration to life, children will hand-draw their own shipwreck site and tell the story behind their

vessel—what it carried, how it sank, and what future archaeologists might uncover about it!

The Urgency of Shipwreck Preservation

Studying shipwrecks has never been more important. Quagga mussels, an invasive species, are rapidly deteriorating Lake Michigan's historic wrecks. Unlike zebra mussels, quagga mussels thrive in deeper waters, covering shipwrecks and accelerating their decay. Their weight and acidic secretions weaken wooden and metal structures, causing them to collapse over time. Maritime archaeologists are racing against time to document and preserve these wrecks before they are lost forever. Programs like Shipwreck Detectives help raise awareness about this urgent issue and inspire future generations to protect Wisconsin's underwater heritage.
