

library systems LS&S is a private company that contracts with municipalities to operate a public library. Their pitch is that they can do it more efficiently and effectively. Here is their website: <u>http://www.lsslibraries.com/</u>. It appears they are making a concerted marketing effort in Wisconsin at this time. It looks like the company sends this email to build their prospect list and then begins a direct marketing campaign from there. The cost they are citing in the email is certainly attention-getting and, in most cases throughout Wisconsin, far above a library's cost per transaction.

Your library's cost per transaction can be easily calculated. Only 9% of Wisconsin libraries have a cost per transaction number that exceeds the \$6.43 cited. Generally speaking libraries with a high cost per transaction simply don't have the population to generate the circulations to offset fixed costs or have very specific reasons for their higher cost per transaction.

LS&S currently doesn't have any library/municipal customers in Wisconsin to the best of my knowledge. Additionally, there is a sense at DPI that the statute may not allow a library board to contract for administration (as opposed to having its own employees) and still maintain its library system affiliation. Though this interpretation has never been tested in court.
