Dogs at the library? Kids can read to certified therapy dogs at Manitowoc Public Library

Dogs at the library? Really? Yes, Manitowoc Public Library has certified therapy dogs that come in every month for a reading program!

So, the dogs read? No, children read to the dogs. It's a program that got started a few years back to give children a non-threatening, non-judgmental opportunity to practice their reading skills.

How does that work, you ask? Let me tell you!

There are several dogs and their owners who volunteer their time to come to the library once a month and let children read to them, pet them, play with them and learn about the dogs.

These dogs have completed tests and training to become therapy dogs. They are part of an organization called Alliance of Therapy Dogs, which was founded in 1990 in Cheyenne, Wyoming. For more about the Alliance, head to https://www.therapydogs.com/alliance-therapy-dogs/.

Dogs must take tests, get registered and obtain insurance to participate in this group. All dogs that complete the process are defined as animals that provide therapeutic intervention. They are not service dogs.

According to the Alliance of Therapy Dogs handbook, those dogs that want to participate must be "more than 1 year of age, healthy, well-mannered and enjoy human contact."

Since therapy dogs are used in many different settings, each dog has its own unique characteristics. Some dogs are used in hospitals and nursing homes, some in disaster relief areas, and some with special-needs students. More and more, though, therapy dogs are being used in schools and libraries to provide a safe environment for children who struggle with reading.

When children read to dogs, the dog does not correct their pronunciation or help them in any way. The dogs are simply a quiet listener. This makes it a more relaxing atmosphere for the struggling reader. No one is critiquing them, no one is correcting them when they make a mistake, and there are no expectations that need to be met. The child simply reads to the dog.

Since the pressure is off the child, oftentimes this helps improve the child's attitude toward reading. Instead of being a stressful or dreaded exercise, reading becomes relaxed and fun. This change in attitude for the child can help them by giving them the motivation and incentive to enjoy reading.

Those who enjoy an activity are more inclined to want to continue it, thereby increasing their skills. Children who learn to enjoy

reading are more willing to do more reading, which, in turn, makes them a better reader. All this just from having dogs listen to a child read. Incredible!

Manitowoc Public Library has had certified therapy dogs for the past few years as a part of our Family Activity Nights. On the second Tuesday of the month at 6:30 p.m., dogs and handlers come to the library and enjoy time spent reading with children of various ages. The children bring their own books or pick books from the library shelves. Then, they find a quiet spot on the rug and read to a dog.

Handlers are great at providing some interaction with the child, if needed, and are always willing to share information about the dog's breed and characteristics. Many of the handlers have information cards, like collecting cards, which show a picture of their dog and details such as how old the dog is, what breed it is and what it likes to do.

The next time you stop by Manitowoc Public Library on the second Tuesday of the month, come up to the Children's Department for an opportunity to have your children read to certified therapy dogs. Lucy, Sophie and Bucky Bear are sure to be there with their heads on the floor, paws stretched out and ears pointed toward the child sitting next to them.

It has often been said that dogs are man's best friend, and this program is proof of that! It is a sight to warm your heart and inspire a lifelong love of reading.










2017 has been packed away in our memories and 2018 is filled with our hopes for the future.

All of the staff at MPL is excited to be able to offer services to our community once again seven days a week in the very near future. However, the fun doesn't stop there. Here are a few more sneak peeks for 2018 at MPL:

- Create Tomorrow: A Fundraising Gala Keep your eyes open for an article in the upcoming weeks about our 2018 fundraiser on March 10. We will have an aerial dance performance, music, food and more. Tickets are on sale now on our website at http://www.manitowoclibrary.org/gala/.
- First-floor Re-Organization A timeline and implementation of our first-floor redesign process will take place in 2018. In this new layout, we hope to offer community creation spaces for art, music, engineering and more. We also hope to create a dedicated computer and business area in this space. Finally, we hope to raise sufficient funds to add a fireplace area with coffee and conversation spaces. We'll also make sure to have plenty of room for our collections, meeting rooms, study rooms and all the other favorites in our library.

 parents to have a better understanding of the impact of conversation on the early literacy
 needs of their child.
- 20th Anniversary Celebration: MPL celebrates 20 years on Quay Street in 2018! To mark the occasion, we will have a grand celebration on Aug. 4. It will be a fun-tastic event for all ages with jugglers, a bounce house, food, games and more! Come join us!
- Superhero Saturday on April 28: It's a bird ... it's a plane ... NO, it's Superhero Saturday!
 This all-day, all-ages event focuses on exciting activities revolving around superheroes
 both real-life local ones, as well as fictional. It's sure to be a spectacular event you won't want to miss.
- Seed and Grow: We're offering this new initiative in spring 2018 with our circulating seed library. Details are still being worked out, but what we aim to accomplish is the ability for a patron to "checkout" seeds, take them home, and share their progress with us as they grow. We'll also have educational programming to go along with this.
