- We provided multiple copies of titles to 22 book groups as well as 11 titles for an area elementary school teacher.


## 6. What's coming up?

### **Programming Highlights**

- **Skin Cancer Screening**: Karen worked with staff from Froedtert and Forefront to offer a September 15 no-cost skin cancer screening.
