EMERGENCY PREPAREDENESS/FIRE SAFETY



We will be taking part in the training session for the All-Staff meeting coming up in September. We will be focusing on refreshers on safety/security exercises we have trained on in the past couple of years.

REPAIR/MAINTENANCE MANAGEMENT



We continue to utilize our modified control schedules that allow the HVAC some "downtime". Along with our meticulous daily cleaning, we will easily last throughout the cooling season and until our new HVAC unit is installed.

We continue the replacement of the 3' and 4' light fixtures to LED. With the freedom of being closed Sundays, we have also taken the time to upgrade some of the safety features that are lacking from the original installation, such as providing rubber grommets for cushioning wire bundles that are fed through sharp conduit.

We are also advancing through eliminating some of the unused, outdated, and soiled assets, such as soiled chairs, broken office equipment, and outdated shelving units. Some of the very worn items are thrown out, while others are recycled.

4. Outreach Activities:

- Lisa P. and MCLS staff met with ILS (Integrated Library System) administrators for OWLS (Outagamie Winnebago Library System) to give an overview of the SirsiDynix catalog system since they are considering a migration from their current system.
- Lisa P. worked with the Local Subject Headings subcommittee of the Statewide Bibliographic Standards Committee to prep their WLA (Wisconsin Library Association) conference poster session for October and continued work on subject heading recommendations for catalog records.
- Meredith gave tours of the first floor of the library to other city department staff. The

- Sharon and Betty represented MPL at the MPSD Community Fair at Washington Middle School. They promoted library cards, as well as the many free resources we provide to students and families.
- Kirsten and Lynn created four new program options for school field trips—topics include preschool and Grades 1-2 programs on creepy crawlies (bugs), dinosaurs, silly stories and the hilarious books of Mo Willems.
- The library served as the location for local law enforcement's National Night Out, which drew about 150 attendees.
- Storytime favortie Pete the Cat made a special appearance during a storytime for Ascend Services youth.
- Betty added several new items to our toy library, thanks to a generous donation of toys and games by a local patron.
- Sharon led tours of the Youth Services department to city employees.

STAFF DEVELOPMENT

- Patti attended Wisconsin Literacy's Forward Conference in Brookfield.
- Public Services staff have been engaging in a variety of online learning opportunities through Learn
 with NoveList, a tool that trains library staff how to engage with readers about their interests and
 recommend books they might enjoy.

OPERATION ACTIVITIES

Programming Highlights

- Summer Reading Program: The Summer Reading Program was a great success this year, with a total participation of 2,849 people (up 13% from 2024). Tony played a key role in efforts for adults, while Emily and other staff also assisted a great deal.
- ManitoWalk Historic Downtown Walking Tour: Tony led two historic downtown walking tours this month the first after a long break.
- **Skin Cancer Screening**: Karen is working with staff from Froedtert and Forefront to plan a September 15 no-cost skin cancer screening to take place at the Library.
- Volunteer Fair: Lisa D is coordinating a Volunteer Fair for September 17 from 2-5pm.

- Winter Reading Program: Staff are already preparing for our Winter Reading Program, which will start in January.
- Other adult programming included a viewing of *The Minecraft Movie*, Cats on Mats, Glowforge Badging, and Drop-In Chess Club.

Other Operational Highlights

- **First Floor Renovation Project**: Karen continues to work with vendors to select flooring. Stacey arranged a quote for electrical updates for the Adult Computer and Business Center area.
- Marketing: Tim and Emily focused on promoting the Shelf Care Boxes, ManitoWalk Historic Downtown Walking Tours, and other programming. Staff continue to submit articles for Seehafer News, as well as appear on Coffee on the Coast and Be Our Guest.
- **Homebound Services:** Margo and June reported a strong participation in the Summer Reading Program for Homebound Services patrons, with 24 participants this year. This is the highest level they have experienced since they started offering the program to Homebound Services patrons in 2017.
- One-to-One Literacy: Patti has continued to whittle down the waiting list for individual tutoring, while supporting efforts to serve many learners in our Conversation Circles. She completed One-to-One's submissions for the annual Wisconsin Literacy demographic survey and the annual ProLiteracy survey.
